Dedicated Offerings

Dedicated Offerings provide a way for our Unitarian Universalist Society of Amherst community to recognize and financially support worthy organizations engaged in projects that reflect our guiding Unitarian-Universalist principles.

On one Sunday every month (except for June, July, and August) we schedule a Dedicated Offering (DO), recognizing that our Society needs our support on the other Sundays of the month. Dedicated Offerings are suggested by both individuals and committees of the Society, and the program is managed by the Minister and the Dedicated Offering Committee. Our goal is to cover a wide range of areas of need in our area and in the larger world, including these categories: local, regional, national, international, environmental, medical, educational, animal rights, arts/music/culture, and different ages and genders. Recipients for FY18 have been chosen. Forms for suggesting recipients for next year are available in the Meetinghouse office.

Thank you for showing your support for the Dedicated Offering program, not only with your contributions to the DO recipients themselves, but also with your contributions to the Society on other Sundays when our budget counts on those receipts. Remember that no one is required to contribute to our Dedicated Offering recipients – this is a voluntary initiative.

CORRECTION: A list of FY17 Dedicated Offering recipients published in our August newsletter inadvertently omitted the **Planned Parenthood League of Massachusetts**.

This September's Dedicated Offering will be collected on September 17 for **North Quabbin Citizen Advocacy**, a 501(c) (3) non profit privately funded program. Nate Johnson, Executive Director, and **Bonnie Frank**, Administrative Director, will talk about the work of building community and working towards social justice.

The purpose of North Quabbin Citizen Advocacy (NQCA) is to provide protection and advocacy for vulnerable people by fostering and supporting freely given, one-to-one relationships between people connected to the nine towns of the North Quabbin area. The program focuses on developing relationships for individuals of all ages with developmental disabilities and/or mental impairments and for elders with degenerative conditions which affect their mental capacity.

People with intellectual disabilities, mental health disorders, and other significant mental impairments are more dependent on others for support. In addition, they frequently face a great deal of rejection, isolation, and other

hurtful experiences. In part this is due to their impairments. More significantly, these and other hurtful experiences come from negative social attitudes and structures. The combination of isolation, impairment, and negative attitudes make people with disabilities more vulnerable to yet more hurtful experiences. (Wolfensberger, *Social Role Valorization*, 1998.) In the current climate of reduced government funding for services, this vulnerability is increased.

Nate and Bonnie will share a few stories of lives that have been saved and changed by freely given, voluntary relationships.

Connecticut River Clean-Up Scheduled for Saturday, September 23, 2017

The Green Sanctuary Committee is again sponsoring this year's event for the UU Society of Amherst. **Karen Fisk** will lead our team this year. **Ron Grosslein** will help with the planning. We'll meet at 9:30 A.M. in South Deerfield at the Sunderland Bridge over the Connecticut River. If you cross the bridge going west, take the first right after the bridge on River Road, and take the first right after that into the gravel parking lot there. We'll clean up trash under the bridge and up and down the riverbank a bit, and then move upstream 1 mile to another parking area.

We'll also do the Sunderland side of the bridge. Parking is up the access road in the town office lot.

We expect to finish about noon. Wear clothing appropriate to the weather that can get dirty and wet, and make sure everyone in your group can recognize poison ivy. Work gloves or rubber gloves are a good idea.

Bring a snack and something to drink. If you're bringing minors who are not your children, their parents will have to sign a permission form, which you can get from Ron. Please bring the signed form when you come to the clean-up. If you are willing and able, please bring other potentially useful items such as trash bags, rakes, shovels, recycling bins, rope, insect repellent, wash water and soap.

We will keep an eye on the weather, and send an email to those who sign up, if the event is cancelled. See you at the river!



Our Whole Lives

The Unitarian Universalist Society of Amherst is excited to be able to offer a year-long high school (9th-10th) OWL program. OWL (for “Our Whole Lives”) is a unique program in that it invites discussion of sex and sexuality within the context of Justice and Equity, Self Worth, Sexual Health, and Responsibility—and why those topics dovetail with our seven Unitarian Universalist principles. The program, while fostering community among the youth, also helps each person define personal guidelines to increase positive outcomes, reduce risks, know how to say no and how to say yes. We encourage each person to strive to be their best self. We also encourage open communication with parents.

This program is 12 sessions long and provides 24 hours of critical, developmentally appropriate programming on human sexuality. Our facilitators are **Karen Fisk**, who has been trained in OWL facilitation and has taught the program for many years, and **Mary Cornell**, who was recently OWL trained, has a MS in Nursing and is a professor at Holyoke Community College. At the same time that the youth are taking OWL there will be a co-ordinated parent program, which will be run by **Rebecca Fricke**, UUSA Director of Religious Education.

All meetings will run Sundays from 4:45-6:00 P.M. and families must commit to all sessions after October 22.

UUSA COMMUNITY BREAKFAST NEEDS YOU!

The UUSA has been providing volunteers for the free Community Breakfast in the Willie Eaton Social Hall every Wednesday for three years. We serve 80-120 guests a freshly cooked hot meal of eggs, home fries, sausages, pastries, cereal, toast, juice and coffee or tea – all provided by Amherst’s Craig’s Doors. Our breakfast is important as the Amherst Survival Center, which is open other days, is closed on Wednesday.

Our breakfast team works closely with Craig’s Doors, which helps people find ways to become empowered and improve the quality of their lives through the creation of safe, respectful shelter and housing.

We regularly experience a shortage of volunteers both in the summer and regular congregational year. Dishwashers and cleanup crew are especially difficult positions to fill, but many other jobs are also available. See list below.

UUSA Safety Policies – Effective Sept 1, 2017

Policies to help provide a safe and enjoyable environment in our Meetinghouse apply to ALL RENTERS AND OTHER USERS OF OUR BUILDING, ***INCLUDING MEMBERS OF THE UUSA AND THEIR GUESTS***, and are effective September 1, 2017.

At least two adults must be present in the same room whenever a child or children are present.

Each renter or other user of UUSA space is responsible for seeing that the person or persons admitted by the user are there to attend the user’s program or event. This means, among other things, that:

- 1) The user is responsible for monitoring persons entering to be sure they are there to attend the program, meeting or other event, and that they go only into the areas of the building being used in connection with the user’s program, meeting or event;
and
- 2) If the user is not able to monitor persons entering the building once the program, meeting or event begins, then the user must lock the exterior doors. (Users may share their cell phone number or post the number on the door to facilitate late entry.)
