Dedicated Offerings

Dedicated Offerings provide a way for our Unitarian Universalist Society of Amherst community to recognize and financially support worthy organizations engaged in projects that reflect our guiding Unitarian-Universalist principles.

On one Sunday every month (except for June, July, and August) we schedule a Dedicated Offering (DO), recognizing that our Society needs our support on the other Sundays of the month. Dedicated Offerings are suggested by both individuals and committees of the Society, and the program is managed by the Minister and the Dedicated Offering Committee. Our goal is to cover a wide range of areas of need in our area and in the larger world, including these categories: local, regional, national, international, environmental, medical, educational, animal rights, arts/music/culture, and different ages and genders. Recipients for FY18 have been chosen. Forms for suggesting recipients for next year are available in the Meetinghouse office.

Thank you for showing your support for the Dedicated Offering program, not only with your contributions to the DO recipients themselves, but also with your contributions to the Society on other Sundays when our budget counts on those receipts. Remember that no one is required to contribute to our Dedicated Offering recipients – this is a voluntary initiative.

The April Dedicated Offering raised \$791.36 for Martin Luther King Jr. Family Services.

<u>This month's Dedicated Offering on May 20</u> will help support the Sanctuary Fund at First Congregational Church of Amherst. Lucio Perez of Springfield, an undocumented Guatemalan immigrant facing deportation, currently resides at the First Congregational Church of Amherst, which is providing him sanctuary while he waits for his case to be reopened after Immigration and Customs Enforcement denied his stay of removal. Providing housing and meals as well as funding a Legal Defense to fight his deportation is costly. Money donated to the Sanctuary Fund of First Congregational Church during the Dedicated Offering will be used to support this effort.

Directions to Howard Apley's at 470 Montague Road (RT 47) Sunderland

From Amherst Center: Go north on North Pleasant Street and continue on Rt. 63 through Leverett, a small bit of Sunderland, and into Montague. Turn left on Rt. 47 (south) and when you re-enter Sunderland turn left at the first driveway (only one mile from the intersection of 63 and 47) identified by three mailboxes near a tree. The driveway forks; go to the house on the right.

From Hadley: From Rt. 9, go north on Rt.116 to Sunderland Center, turn right or north at Rt. 47 and go a shade less than four miles. Turn right at the last driveway in Sunderland, identified by three mailboxes near a tree. The driveway forks; go to the house on the right. (Before you turn you can see the bus turnaround and "entering Montague signs" which are ahead of you).

Balloons will be on the 470 mailbox.



Green Sanctuary

The Green Sanctuary Committee recommends that congregation members concerned about climate change join the Mass Power Forward unified Monday Climate Actions, promoting bold action on state climate change legislation. Following is a description of the recommended action. (Which you can also find on the <u>Climate Action</u> <u>Now Take Action Page</u>).

A summary of the omnibus energy bill referenced below is here.

Call the House Speaker and your Representative to Demand Passage of Clean Energy Legislation

From now through the end of the two year state legislative session on July 31, we need to be escalating the pressure on our legislators in order to ensure that the bills we want will pass. We have 5-7 weeks to help influence what the House will do. That's why every Monday we are encouraging you to make two calls. We're calling the Speaker directly because he controls what comes up on the House agenda.

1. Your state representative (617-722-2000 and ask for your rep.)

2. The Speaker of the House (617-722-2500)

Here's what you do for each call:

First: Contact the office, identify yourself as a constituent and identify the reason you are calling:

My name is _____ and I'd like to ask [the representative to urge leadership] or [Speaker DeLeo] to implement the clean energy policies found in the Senate's new omnibus energy bill, S.2302, which I strongly support. S.2302 contains many of the same bills and policies being considered in the House. Let's keep the momentum rolling at this critical moment – including, but not limited to:

1. (H. 2700) Increasing the renewable portfolio standard to 3% per year

2. (H.3400) Reforming the Department of Public Utilities

3. (H.3396) Implementing solar policies to benefit low-income communities

4. (H.2913) Codifying Environmental Justice regulations from the Patrick administration

5. (H.2149) Setting new emission standards for 2030 and 2040 under the Global Warming Solutions Act for curbing emissions.

Next, give your personal reason for why you are supporting these policies. Thank the staffer for their time. Then log your response here.

On April 12, 1,000 letters were delivered to Immigration officials in support of Lucio, who still awaits a hearing date concerning his deportation.
