Children in K–Grade 5 begin with the entire congregation in the sanctuary at 10:30, our Time for All Ages, before transitioning to the downstairs classrooms. Preschoolers are welcome to begin in the sanctuary or go directly to their teacher downstairs before the service begins. Youth Groups meet at different times depending on program needs and youth preferences.




Lifespan Religious Education is all about building faith and community!

Preschool

The preschool, under Jacy's loving guidance, explores playing together with kindness and attention to the whole group.



Grades K-6

Led by Director of Religious Education (DRE), Rebecca Fricke, and a team of adult volunteers Most Sundays children will start upstairs for the Opening Words, Chalice Lighting and first hymn. Children will then be sung downstairs to continue their own service. At least once a month children will stay upstairs for worship the whole time. Conversations and activities will nurture our Unitarian Universalist faith heritage of public service, anti-racism and anti-oppression activism.

Grades 7-9: Coming of Age (COA) and Neighboring Faiths

Facilitators: Rebecca Fricke and Jenn Chylack

Coming of Age: Youth spend the year devoted to learning about a wide variety of spiritual practices. The year culminates in a "This I believe" ceremony.

(Alternate years) Neighboring Faiths: During the year the youth will visit faith communities in the area. The program reaffirms UU values and personal beliefs through a better understanding of the beliefs of others. Religions explored may include: UU, Judaism, Islam, Christianity (including: Baptist, Catholic, Lutheran), Hinduism, Buddhism, and Earth-based religions

Our Whole Lives - OWL

Sexuality Education offers step-by-step, age-appropriate, lessons for children and youth facilitated by trained adults. Why is sexuality education important? Honest, accurate information about sexuality changes lives. It dismantles stereotypes and assumptions, builds self-acceptance and self-esteem, fosters healthy relationships, improves decision making, and has the potential to save lives.

OWL classes are offered on a rotating basis for K-2, 4-6 and High School.
