Dedicated Offerings

One Sunday every month (except for June, July, and August), we have traditionally scheduled a Dedicated Offering to recognize and financially support worthy organizations engaged in projects that reflect our guiding Unitarian-Universalist principles.

This fall, the Dedicated Offering (DO) Committee has decided to have just one major offering. Given the significantly lower plate offerings which have happened since we suspended in-person services and began Zoom services, the DO committee agreed that it would be more productive to feature one local social service entity every three or four months in FY21, rather than currently collecting very little each month. To this end, we've chosen Craig's Doors, the homeless shelter, to fund this fall, with the offering to be collected in November. Craig's Doors is open during the winter months only. Many of the guests are attendees at our Wednesday community breakfasts (now served outside). The COVID virus miraculously has not hit the homeless in the Amherst area yet, but the possibilities are real that this group may be hit hard this fall and winter. The DO Committee would like to offer the UUSA the opportunity to be as generous as possible to our homeless friends. Thank you!

Our UUSA congregation was generous during FY20, even after the arrival of the pandemic. We collected a total of \$5917.28 during DOs for the following organizations: Tapestry Health, UU/UNO, Goodwin Memorial Church, A Positive Place, Homework House, Gandara Center, Sunrise Movement, and Children's Advocacy Center.

Before I get excited about the beginning of our "church" year, I wan to reflect on the wonderful summer services we have enjoyed.

Years ago a friend said to me, "All of us have at least one good sermon in us." After attending our summer services, I believe this to be true.

Besides the summer Sunday services, I want to give a "shout out" to **Jacy Armenti**, who has provided weekly Zoom sessions for as many as seven pre-schoolers. That's amazing, and a phenomenal attendance for summer Sundays! It speaks to the importance of providing our very youngest members with an opportunity to be engaged in this spiritual community.

This Fall, our congregation has the opportunity to participate in an intensive learning and workshop series called "Beloved Conversations." The series addresses the hard work of recognizing patterns of white privilege, institutional racism and other oppressions within ourselves, our congregation and beyond. Also in this newsletter, look for information on how to participate in our annual **Connecticut River Clean-up.** The Green Sanctuary Committee will be providing guidelines on how to participate in a safe way, offering our spiritual community an opportunity to demonstrate our support of our 7th Principle.

Religious Education Ministry



Help Keep the Connecticut River Clean at Annual Source to Sea Clean Up

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 26, 9:30 TO NOON at various locations. (Sign up by September 19)

The UUSA has participated in the *Source to Sea Clean Up* for many years – and it is making a difference. The Source to Sea Clean Up, sponsored by the Connecticut River Conservancy, is a great way to be outside, near the water, and with friends doing good work. Of course, our first priority is to avoid spreading disease, so we'll take some serious precautions:

Effective face masks are required,

Please bring your own work gloves and hand sanitizer.

Families will work as a group, and other groups will have no more than four people.

We will keep an eye on signups and make sure there are enough work sites available that we can spread out appropriately. Please join us.

Sign Up for Workshop Series "Beloved Conversations" by September 20

<u>Good News!</u> The UUSA Board has authorized funds to start the "Beloved Conversations" program as a virtual workshop series at our congregation. For detailed information, which is continuously being updated, go to this site <u>www.meadville.edu/beloved</u>. Here you can watch a video on this racial justice program and see many details about the initial workshop this Fall and what future workshops will look like.

This virtual workshop series will initially focus on the internal work we each need to do to engage in racial justice. The program will "include individual study of videos and readings, accompanied by reflection prompts and suggested conversations with 'critical friends' chosen by the participants; bi-weekly small group conversations in a 'learning pod;' and larger, monthly, facilitated meaning-making sessions." We need to register between September 1–20 for the Fall program. There will be other programs continuing in the Spring and following years.

<u>Sign up Early by contacting Steve Rice!</u> The cost is \$150 per person and, while the UUSA Board would like people to pay as much as they can afford, the UUSA will pay up to \$150/person with a maximum of \$1500 allocated for this program. There will be discounts for everyone if 10 or more people are able to sign up. GREEN SANCTUARY

Ask Our Reps to Sign No Fossil Fuel Money Pledge

Over 200 political leaders and candidates for office in Massachusetts have signed the No Fossil Fuel Money Pledge, including Senators Warren and Markey, US Reps. Jim McGovern and Joe Kennedy, and Pioneer Valley State Reps. Lindsay Sabadosa and Natalie Blais. The pledge asks our politicians to "... not take contributions over \$200 from oil, gas, and coal industry executives, lobbyists, and PACs and instead prioritize the health of our families, climate, and democracy over fossil fuel industry profits."

Given our state's slow pace of progress on climate policies to meet our 2030 and 2050 carbon emissions reduction goals, the Green Sanctuary Committee would like to encourage all our representatives to take the pledge and prevent fossil fuel money from dictating policy, as it has in many other states.

We have put together a set of resources [at this link] for you to write your own *Thank You* letter to a politician who has taken the pledge (e.g., Rep. McGovern) and *Pledge Request* for those who haven't (e.g., Tracy Lovvom, who's challenging McGovern). FYI, both State Rep. Mindy Domb and Sen. Jo Comerford have yet to sign the pledge, though both have been champions of effective climate policies.

Thank you for advocating for smart climate policies!

ION CORNER

<u>ION (Interfaith Opportunity Network)</u> has taken advantage of Zoom bringing us closer and in many cases making it easier to have both meetings and devotionals throughout the summer.

Our most immediate project involves acting for restorative justice for Native People on the 400th anniversary of the settlement of Europeans on Native lands in the Northeast on Sunday, October 18, 2:00 p.m. (rain date Oct 25), at Unity Park (1st and Unity Streets), Turners Falls, MA (simultaneous broadcast via YouTube). Unity Park is near the site of the Great Falls Massacre, where around 200 Native women, children and elders were killed in their sleep. If gathering in person is not safely possible, a virtual gathering will be held via YouTube and Facebook. We will have the opportunity to listen to Native speakers and hear music; reflect and develop relationships of respect and solidarity; and act for restorative justice. Earlier this summer, after the murder of George Floyd, ION sponsored a vigil at the Amherst Town Common which grew to almost 1500 people. Over 120 people participated in a vigil in South Hadley organized by Center Church. Weekly vigils from 10 -10:30 A.M. every Saturday continue to be held near that Town Common on Rte 116. All are welcome.

Last Fall, when an ION member brought to our attention the racist imagery on both our state flag and seal, which show a Native figure standing beneath an arm wielding a sword, we worked towards changing that image. We are the ONLY state in this country with racist images on its seal or flag. A bill which will study changing this image recently passed the Senate unanimously and is in now the House Ways and Means Committee.
