The UUSA Board of Trustees has voted unanimously to change the COVID-19 Building Use Policy to "mask optional" in most of the sanctuary when the risk level is low. The new policy is effective August 6. A "mask required" area will be maintained on the balcony, next to the windows. Masks are always welcome. Our new policy will depend on weekly tracking of wastewater using BioBot Analytics COVID-19 website. If wastewater tests remain below 1000 copies/mL in Hampshire County, the UUSA will remain in Low or Green risk level and continue as "mask optional," If the risk level increases above that level, we will move to "mask required" or more stringent limits, if necessary. Dedicated Offerings

From September to June, our Society donates each month to a dedicated offering recipient and splits 50/50 every Sunday's offering plate with the recipient organization. Since September 2022, our members have generously contributed the following: \$1,025 to Letcher County in Eastern KY; \$875 to the Hospice of the Fisher Home; \$2,100 to Abortion Rights Fund of Western Massachusetts; \$950 for Local Energy Advocates; \$1000 to Ohketeau Cultural Center; \$1,375 for Rise Above, \$1,000 for The Sojourner Truth School for Social Change Leadership, and \$1,375 for the Wildflower Alliance.

More about the Dedicated Offering Committee

The Dedicated Offering Committee (DOC) selects non-profit organizations that our Society will support with donations from our Sunday collections September - June. We split our collections 50/50 with them. In turn, our UU Society is enriched by learning about organizations we did not know about that are helping enrich our world. The DOC solicits members for names of specific organizations and asks they complete a specific DO form, which is available in the office or on-line at <u>https://forms.gle/hypyMGzMJHgeAVf26</u>. A representative from a chosen organization is asked to speak about it on the First Sunday of its month.

August Co-President's Letter

A dictionary definition of the word **feedback** is "*information about reactions to a product, a person's performance, or a decision etc. which is used as a basis for improvement.*" At this point in our congregational year when we are about to begin a new worship season, it seems like a good time to ask for feedback from our members and committed friends. What has been your experience of the leadership, management, and general governance of the UUSA over the past year?

Governance is a shared responsibility of the Minister, the Board of Trustees, and the many committees, ministries, groups, circles, and teams of the congregation. Please share your thoughts and suggestions using this "<u>digital suggestion box</u>" (an email). Our Congregational Administrator will forward your feedback to the Minister, Board of Trustees and/or committee, as appropriate. The feedback you share will be used "*as a basis for improvement*" over the next few years.

Here are a few of the actions and decisions that we made over the past year relating to governance, some of which were guided by your feedback.

- We returned from the isolation of COVID restrictions and brought Sunday services back to the sanctuary. At the same time, we continued to offer an online option for those unable to attend services in person.
- We "test drove" and approved a new covenant.
- We introduced a new Director of Religious Education to the congregation.
- We had our first face-to-face social events since the pandemic shut us down, with the cookout at Groff Park, the pancake breakfast in the Social Hall, the Music and Cookie Swap, and the Fundraiser -Gala.
- We participated in a series of Cottage Meetings, in person and online.
- We invited all committee, ministry, circle, and team leaders to three Department Meetings to try to improve communication and collaboration in governance of the congregation.
- We approved the much-needed repair work on the siding of our beloved meetinghouse.
- We organized a congregational common read of the book *An Indigenous People's History of the United States* by Roxane Dunbar-Ortiz.
- Many of us committed to practice using the tools of Dynamic Governance (aka sociocracy) and participated in a UUA-sponsored national training, *Widening the Circle of Governance in UU Congregations*.
- We approved a change in our bylaws to clarify the responsibilities of membership in the UUSA.
- We raised enough money in a winter appeal to balance our 2022-23 budget and initiated a new generosity-based pledge framework that resulted in an increase in pledges for 2023-24.
- We saw the emergence of two new committees: the Reproductive Justice Action Group, and the Sociocracy Support Circle.
- We celebrated Reverend Rachael's acceptance into Full Ministry and approved a 3-month sabbatical leave to begin in the spring of 2024.
- We passed a 2023-24 budget which included an increase in salaries for our much-loved and deserving minister and staff.
- We passed a new COVID Policy to make masks optional in the meetinghouse beginning in August providing the risk remains low.

We recognize that the list above focuses more on governance than ministry and does not include weekly activities such as Sunday services (including sermons, music and religious education), our contributions to non-profit organizations in our community through Dedicated Offerings, feeding people on Wednesday mornings, clean-up activities at the Connecticut and Green Rivers, the good work of the Caring Circle and Pastoral Care Team, and on and on and on.... we do a lot! At this point we are asking for your feedback on leadership, management and governance over the past year. 

This new book invites readers of any faith to explore practices for accountability that can bring us into wholeness and make a difference in our personal, community, and national relationships. It will provide a foundation for our discussions of reparations and our commitment to the Eighth Principle. It's a terrific follow-up to our common read last year, *An Indigenous People's History of the U.S.*

When Conversation Turns to Suicide Aug. 3 - 4, Bangs Community Center– 9 a.m. - 5 p.m.

When Conversation Turns to Suicide is a 16-hour training based in the Alternatives to Suicide approach, and intended as an alternative to ASIST, QPR, and similar approaches that remain rooted in conventional medicalized systems. This training is open to providers, family members, peer supports, first responders, and anyone else who wants to learn how to offer support to someone who is suicidal. Participants will learn:

- Common Myths about Suicide
- A framework for being in conversation with someone who is struggling
- The links between trauma (including systemic oppression) and suicide
- The importance of power sharing
- And more!

This training is FREE, but donations are welcome! This training is offered through a collaboration of the Wildflower Alliance and Community Responders for Equity, Safety, & Service (CRESS). This training is intended for people living, working, and/or going to school in Amherst, MA.

A few reminders: Participants must miss no more than two hours of training content (not including breaks) in order to receive a certificate of completion. Please note that there are significant similarities (as well as significant differences) between this training and the Alternatives to Suicide Group Facilitator training. Although we still require people to follow our attendance guidelines even if they have completed the other training, please be prepared for some overlaps in information offered (although we do find that each group is different and there is still much wisdom to be gained even if similar information is being offered).


Our Caring Ministries
