*The UUSA Board of Trustees has voted unanimously to change the COVID-19 Building Use Policy to "mask optional" in most of the sanctuary when the risk level is low. A "mask required" area will be maintained on the balcony, next to the windows. Masks are always welcome. Our new policy depends on weekly tracking of wastewater using BioBot Analytics COVID-19 website. If wastewater tests remain below 1000 copies/mL in Hampshire County, the UUSA will remain in Low or Green risk level and continue as "mask optional." If the risk level increases above that level, we will move to "mask required" or more stringent limits, if necessary. Dedicated Offerings

From September to June, our Society donates each month to a dedicated offering recipient and splits 50/50 every Sunday's offering plate with the recipient organization.

The Dedicated Offerings for the month of March is for **Girls Inc. of the Valley**. Their Executive Director, Suzanne Parker (an Amherst resident), will address us on Sunday, March 3. Headquartered in Holyoke, their motto is "Inspiring all girls to be strong, smart, and bold." They offer both school-year and summer programs, aimed at girls from 3rd through 12th grade, offering STEM subjects (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) as well as arts and crafts, dance, financial literacy and more. Girls Inc. empowers, edu-

cates, and guides young people forward, helping them navigate the challenges in their lives. The combination of **long-lasting mentoring relationships**, a **pro-girl environment**, and **research-based programming** equips youth to navigate gender, economic, and social barriers, and grow up **healthy**, **educated**, and **independent**.

We will report in a future newsletter what we raised in December for Etta International, Empowerment through the Arts; in January for Reproductive Equity Now; and in February for Healing Across the Divides. In September we raised \$1,000 for UUA Disaster Relief Fund to support the Montpelier VT UU congregation, which suffered a great loss when the Connecticut river flooded its building; in October \$1,175 for Maui Strong to support victims of the wildfires which devastated Lahaina in western Maui, Hawa; and in November \$850 for the Connecticut River Conservancy (CRC).

The Dedicated Offering Committee selects non-profit organizations that our Society will support with donations from our Sunday collections. We solicit UUSA's members for names of organizations through a form which is available in the office and on-line at https://forms.gle.hypMGzMJHgeAVf26. A representative of the chosen organization is asked to speak about it on the first Sunday of the month. We welcome new members. Co-President's Letter

<u>Growth at UUSA</u> At our Annual Meeting in June 2023, the UUSA membership voted to "bet on ourselves" and support the recommendation of the board to increase the salaries of our amazing staff by using money we had in reserve to balance the budget and cover the increased costs. In the fall, members stepped up again to make a significant down payment on our siding loan.

In both cases, we knew that it only makes sense to make these investments if we believe that the congregation would grow in the long run.

I and all observing our New Member services on February 10 were very encouraged when we saw 15 adults sign the new member guestbook, along with a few of their kids. Overall, 17 new members have signed the book this year.

That is clear evidence that we have something attractive to offer the community and more growth is possible. It is also evidence that our Ministry of Welcome and Membership is doing a wonderful job welcoming new visitors. People are "coming in the door" on Sunday mornings. New folks are coming in and enjoying being part of the community, and longtime members are returning after the pandemic.

Growth is not in-and-of-itself always the right goal for a congregation. However, I believe that it is a necessary one for UUSA at this time. Guidance from the UUA on the operations of a congregation puts us at the nexus between being a "pastoral" size and a "program" size congregation (If you'd like to dig into the details of these descriptions, look at the UUA document, <u>Size Transitions in UU Congregations</u>). In a nutshell, we have "program" size aspirations in terms of the type of impact we want to have on our members and community, but we're constrained by a budget and contributing membership that is more "pastoral" in nature.

There are two ways that we all can help encourage our growth and transition.

- Heed the call from our Committee on Welcoming and Membership to encourage both new and returning members to get involved in the life of the congregation. That is a responsibility for us all.
- Engage with the survey and conversations by the Committee of Shared Ministries as they guide us on the process of crafting our new mission. We need to take time to understand who we are culturally and then use what we learn to create a foundation for change.

Thank you for your past contributions to our community, and thank you in advance for making the commitment to our future, both financially and in welcoming the contributions of others.

John M. Foster

Amherst, MA - John McGaw Foster died of natural causes on January 4, 2024 at the age of 95 at the Elaine Center in Hadley. Born in 1928, he grew up in Swarthmore, PA. After graduating from high school, he attended Swarthmore College, majoring in chemistry. There he met his true love, **Nancy** Abbott. They married in 1951.

Following graduation, John attended Harvard University Medical School, earning a PhD in Biochemistry in 1954. After a two-year postdoc at MIT, he was commissioned as a 1st Lieutenant in the US Army in 1956. He and his family were sent to Kawasaki, Japan, where he was in charge of a medical laboratory.

After military service, John joined the faculty of Boston University in 1958, where he taught and did research for eight years. Next, he spent three years with the National Science Foundation in Washington, DC, evaluating innovative undergraduate programs in biology, which fed his love for college-level teaching. In fall, 1969, he joined the founding faculty of Hampshire College as an associate professor. It was his dream job: Hampshire emphasizes hands-on, experiential learning, often in an interdisciplinary setting. John thrived there, and his programs were popular with students. He retired in 1994 as a full professor after 25 years of dedicated service.

He and Nancy then embarked on a series of outdoor adventures and foreign travels, including backpacking in the Rockies, rafting down the Grand Canyon, and visiting countries as far-flung as China, South Africa, and New Zealand. In 2009, they moved into the Applewood retirement community, which sustained John for 13 years after Nancy passed away in 2010.

John loved the natural world and enjoyed hiking and camping with his family. He also loved classical music and played recorder for many years. He became an enthusiastic member of the Valley Light Opera, contributing in many ways both on stage and off. He also sang with the Berkshire Choral Festival. He was a skilled whitewater canoeist, and he and Nancy often paddled together through rapids. They were both active in the Unitarian Church their entire married life. John served on two ministerial search committees at UUSA, sang and played instruments with the choir, designed and laid out the monthly newsletter, and served as Treasurer on our Board. Throughout the years, John was known for his wry sense of humor, his storytelling ability, and his many puns. He was a generous mentor to his students and a kind and loving husband and father.

John is survived by his son Jeffrey Foster and daughter-in-law Debra Jaqua of Olympia, WA, his daughter Lorena (Lorie) Healy and son-in-law John Healy of Amherst, and grandsons Matthew Denny and Patrick Foster.

Donations may be made in John's memory to the Valley Light Opera or the Massachusetts Audubon Society. A memorial service will be held at our UU Society on Saturday, March 2 at 2 P.M.

Shingle Mingle Registers Cha-chings

The results are in! The fall fundraiser to pay off a chunk of our siding loan was a success. We raised more than \$42,000.

The Board has agreed to the Finance Committee's proposal to pay down our loan from Florence Bank by \$82,000 by combining the \$50,000 already committed from reserves with \$32,000 of the shingle funds re-

ceived to date.

As a result of being able to significantly pay down our loan, we are able to cut our monthly loan payments in FY25 almost in half. We had originally borrowed \$173,942 on a 20-year loan, and we're paying \$1,188 per month out of reserves this fiscal year. In FY'25, loan payments of approximately \$645/month will be part of the annual budget.
